

Apgar score

The **Apgar score** (or Apgar score) is used to evaluate a newborn's vitality and postpartum adaptation. The newborn is assessed **after 1, 5 and 10 minutes after birth**. **5 criteria** are scored, each 0-2 points. The maximum is 10 points. Prognostically important is the value of the score at 5 minutes of life. The score is named after Virginia Apgar. (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Virginia_Apgar)

Criteria ^[1]	2 points	1 point	0 points
Appearance, skin color	pink	acrocyanosis	pale or blue
Heart action	over 100/min.	under 100/min. (bradycardia)	under 60/min. (asystole)
Breathing	loud cry (eupnoea)	irregular, slow (bradypnea)	none (apnea)
Tonus, spontaneous activity	active movement	weak flexion of limbs	without movement
Reaction to irritation (grimaces during nasal suction)	cough	face stretching/retraction	none

Evaluation

- 8-10 points - normal newborn
- 7-4 points - mild birth asphyxia
- < 3 - severe birth asphyxia

Mnemonics

- *English:* Appearance (skin color), Pulse (heart rate), Grimace (reflex irritability), Activity (muscle tone), and Respiration. Or also "How Ready Is This Child": Heart rate, Respiratory effort, Irritability, Tone, and Colour.
- *German:* Atmung, Puls, Grundtonus, Aussehen, Reflux.
